

<u>A Message from our Pastor</u>

Word of the day/month/season... chiaroscuro.

For art lovers this word conjures up the deft use of light and shadow for shape, texture, and even meaning. I can recall standing outside of the art gallery of Princeton University back in my 20's having a conversation with Caroline and a friend about these huge, headless statues (by the famous Magdalena Abakanowicz) that stand out front. "Chiaroscuro," Caroline said, "it is the light, the shadow..." The statues are ambiguous, but layers of meaning come through the way light plays off of them. There is no sense of individual, but – as the title suggests – only *The Crowd*; something dark comes to the surface about the loss of the individual within the whole. The piece is a jarring juxtaposition, an emotional chiaroscuro.

One of the most important facets of our faith is doubt. Ironic as it may be, while I have seen folks for my entire ministry chase certainty as a religious value, it is doubt – the shadow of faith – that gives us the most potential to grow spiritually. The, perhaps, more "real" relationship would be between doubt and revelation, a spiritual chiaroscuro where doubt drives questions, engagement, and revelation, or understanding, brings growth and new doubts and new questions, and so on, and so on...; the static peace of certainty is lost, but what is found is so rich.

The past year has tested many people's limits. So much of what has made our individual lives and communal existence meaningful has been stripped away due to the health, economic, and socio-political crises, and yet, we are living a shared experience within it. Some people have found a new peace in this way of living and others have been broken by it. As a society, there is a push to reopen our society on the one hand, and a pull to do so in a way that minimizes the risk of shutting down completely.

I have noticed a rush of energy to seize the moment and return as quickly as possible to normal. We have heard that schools may be returning 100% to in-person experience soon, and our own church leaders have been talking since the end of fall to understand the

conditions needed to return to in-person gatherings here at the church. We want the certainty of knowing we can move forward, and there are promising signs. And yet... the shadows of doubt remain. In the news this past week, questions have arisen regarding the new California strain of the virus, the efficacy of vaccines improperly stored, challenges with distribution, and even the continued wintry weather have dampened decision-making for leaders and businesses across the country... push and pull, light and dark, doubt and – for the moment – no new revelation.

I return to prayer, to our Holy Book, and to our faith. The decision we are making about how to reopen will balance – as they have since the earliest days of the pandemic – the spiritual health needs of our community with the physical health of our members and staff. These decisions do not happen in a vacuum and cannot be separated from our faithful reflection on God's call and presence in our lives. During the season of Lent that we have just begun, we are taking a spiritual journey together through the *Psalms of Ascent*. These are the fifteen psalms used by pilgrims of the biblical era as preparation for the three big feasts of the religious year (like Passover). The second to last of these psalms is all about community, "How very good and pleasant it is when brethren live together in unity..."

The psalm notes how important it is for us to *be* together, to live with each other, be united and remain connected. It also holds a subtext of what love looks like. The beauty is more than finding company, but rather in loving each other and caring for them and their interests. The psalm encapsulates so much of the intent God has for creation – love as a love of neighbor, as a justice of caring beyond our own, individual interests, and recognizing that unity is different than agreement.

Our fractured world needs more unity, connection, community, and the health crisis has only deepened the divide, it seems. In the coming weeks and months, we – those people of faith – will have a chance to *be* the light in the midst of all that darkness, a reminder and living revelation of good for people in difficult times.

<u>Clerk's Corner</u>

Highlights from the February 9, 2021Session Meeting.

The Moderator's Report by Jeremy included some detail on how we are investing in PCW:

- Tom Kort was hired and is leading two Bible studies.
- The Stewardship Commission is bringing on a consultant to begin a generosity ministry that is not just about money. It will be about helping our members live into their discipleship.
- Jeremy is working with Faith Formation to plan several classes after Easter on "Atonement". He will be leading some of the classes- details to follow.
- Considering tools needed for all ministries such as a fiberoptic back bone allowing uninterrupted wireless connection. This will be a large investment which will increase bandwidth; downloads and uploads from the website to engage more easily; live streaming services; and a wider channel of information going out from PCW.
- ACS Database- Laure Park and Liz Miller are working on identifying the needs of the database, the desired outcomes and which new tools are best to connect with the database to increase engagement. Another group will be formed to implement this program. Input will be needed from all areas of ministry.

Jeremy said that in our relationships, the very blessing of God, life and soul happen when we are connected in community. Jeremy thanked the Session for keeping the congregation connected through worship, learning, connection and service over the past year. People are yearning to be more connected than they currently are.

Session Updates:

- Youth Rebuilding Hope/High School Mission Trip- Courtney Nemec reported that the small group planning the
 mission trip decided to not raise funds this year. They are not sure what they will be doing in June, but it will be
 local. They have \$25,000 from last year's Mission trip that did not happen. They will do small fundraisers in
 the spring if needed. Courtney and the youth will be in videos during the next three Sunday worship services
 talking about the local missions that they participated in this past year. They will be asking for prayers for the
 advisors, kids, and helpers.
- The Session voted to send out information about the Go Fund Me page for Whitney Fauntleroy so individuals can contribute She was a former Seminary Intern that worked at PCW about 10 years ago. She had a cancerous tumor removed from her spine and is now paralyzed. She needs money for home health care so she can leave the hospital. The goal is \$100,000. So far \$31,000 has been raised.

• Session passed Stewardship's motion to approve proceeding with applying and accepting a second Paycheck Protection Plan (PPP) loan for the church and the nursery school in the amount of \$383,000 (based on 2X the monthly average monthly payroll costs). The first loan was \$486,000 for both the church (approximately 40%) and nursery school (approximately 60%). The loan was used to pay salaries and utilities.

Correspondence:

- PCW received a letter and check for \$100.00 from Fairview Cemetery on 1/2/21. The letter stated: "2020 has been a year that has tried and tested all of us and reinforces the need to rely on each other. Our community has helped in reaching out to those in need. Enclosed please find a check for use, at your discretion, in your benevolence fund, compassion fund or an outreach fund for your congregation or the community at-large. We here at Fairview appreciate your care and compassion always, and especially during this most difficult year. May you have a happy and safe holiday and New Year!" A thank you note was sent and the check was deposited in the "Undesignated Mission" fund.
- Amy Cummings, Ruling Elder, submitted her resignation due to family obligations. The Session approved her request.

Administrative Business:

- The Session voted to accept the "Voting by Electronic Communication Policy". This outlines when and how electronic voting can be used.
- Lisa Black, Barbara McLaughlan, and Pam Shaw were selected as "voting" and Howard Adams as "nonvoting" Elders to attend the North East Presbytery meeting on Saturday, 2/13/21.
- Howard Adams, Barbara McLaughlan, and Pam Shaw were selected to represent PCW at the last meeting of the Elizabeth Presbytery.
- Please see the "Notes" from both meetings and a short History of The Presbytery of Elizabeth in the March Spire.
- A draft Session calendar of annual events was shared for review and input from Session members.
- The Session voted to call the Annual Congregational/Corporation Meeting for Sunday, March 28, 2021 at 12:00 pm to hear the results of the financial audit and to vote on the nominations from the Congregational Nominating Committee (CNC) for Elders, Deacons and CNC members-at-large.

Elizabeth Presbytery becomes Northwest Presbytery

A "presbytery" is a group of congregations in a regional area connected with one another by confessional unity and communion in service and ministry. We, the Presbytery of Elizabeth, have been committed to fulfilling the mission of the kingdom of God through the proclamation of the gospel of Christ. Our desire has always been to see this kingdom grow through the planting of new churches and continuing care and oversight given to established congregations.

The Presbytery of Elizabeth finds its historical beginnings in the First Presbytery (The Presbytery of Philadelphia) organized in 1706 under the leadership of Rev. Francis Makemie. The First Presbyterian Church of Woodbridge became part of the Presbytery of Philadelphia in 1710. Between 1710 and 1870 the Presbytery was reformed six times

The Presbytery of Elizabeth was constituted on June 21, 1870. The Presbytery of Elizabeth boundaries were: "To comprise the counties of Union and Somerset (except the churches of Kingston and Bound Brook) and all Hunterdon County between the Newton and New Brunswick Presbyteries and Middlesex County north of the Raritan River."

Because of declining membership and resources the 7 Presbyteries in New Jersey asked the Synod of the Northeast to explore the merging of Presbyteries. On October 13, 2020, our presbytery approved the New Jersey Missional Communities Transitions Working Group's motion to form a new "Northeast" Presbytery whose geographical regions consists of the current Newark Presbytery, the current Palisades Presbytery (except for the congregations of Pompton Valley in Morris County, and Ringwood, West Milford, Bloomingdale, Wanaque and Pompton Lakes in Passaic County), and the geographic region of Union County of the current Elizabeth Presbytery, along with North Plainfield.

Similarly a new "Northwest" Presbytery will be formed from the Elizabeth Presbytery churches in Somerset and Hunterdon Counties except for North Plainfield, along with the churches in Morris, Warren, and Sussex Counties, and three churches in Passaic County.

A new "Central" Presbytery will be formed from the churches, including those from Elizabeth Presbytery, in Middlesex County, Mercer County, in Ocean County from Lacey Township north, and Kingston in Somerset County.

A new "Southern" Presbytery will be formed from the churches in Atlantic, Burlingtion, Camden, Cape May, Cumberland, Gloucester, and Salem Counties and the southern portion of Ocean County south of Lacey Township.

The Presbytery of Elizabeth

Stated Meeting #691 Notes - February 16, 2021

This was the last meeting for The Presbytery of Elizabeth. We learned that the presbytery has a long history of affiliations and changes and we look forward to being part of the newly formed New Jersey Presbyteries. The meeting opened with prayer and worship.

Two final reports of the Administrative Commissions (AC) serving Third Westminster Presbyterian Church and First Presbyterian Church Elizabeth were in the Consent Agenda.

• Third Westminster Presbyterian Church

- Spring 2017-Administrative Council formed
- 6/4/2017- Final worship service
- 7/1/2017- Last Session meeting
- For 25 years, the Institute of Music for Children, a mission of the Third Westminster Presbyterian Church, has continually provided on outstanding opportunity for urban youth to gain not only an appreciation of music and the arts, but also to increase their own self-esteem and confidence as young people and future leaders of our nation. The Institute is now a separate nonprofit.
- A way was found to transition the entire Third Westminster Presbyterian Church campus, along with the financial investments of Third Westminster, now held by the AC, to the Institute of Music for Children. A contract of sale which included financial stipulations about funds from Third Westminster was signed.

• First Presbyterian Church Elizabeth (FPEC)

A "new" congregation which is Presbyterian will continue to work and thrive on this historic location. Through the 501 (c) (3) organization, The Old Historic Trust, even more community outreach will occur using the Snyder Academy Building. Siloam Hope Presbyterian Church, a congregation which has active missions and strong leadership, has moved from Route 1 and 9 to the FPEC location in the middle of Elizabeth adjacent to the Union County Courthouse. This is the church where our Agape Program serves our guests.

We heard Mission Reports from:

Greystone Disaster Preparedness Grants Funding Team- voted on local mission grants Johnsonburg Restore El Centro Elizabeth Port Center Music Institute

We heard updates on three of the new Presbyteries that will be joined by groups of the churches that have been part of Presbytery of Elizabeth.

The meeting closed with prayer and wishes for everyone to be active in their new presbyteries.

Notes from the New Presbytery Meeting 2/13/2021

Following an inspiring worship service, the group of approximately 125 attendees heard a presentation regarding Camp Johnsonburg. There is currently a group of young adults living at the Camp and assisting with local food banks. They have created a community to nurture one another as they consider the next step in their lives - college, employment, or another option. Camp Johnsonburg is open and has programs running during COVID. They plan to be open at 50% capacity this summer. There are Spring volunteer opportunities available and they continue to offer cabins for "sabbath rest".

After hearing the story of Abraham and Sarah being visited by the three strangers, we discussed in small break-out groups times when we felt particularly welcome someplace - church or elsewhere. We then discussed what we have done this past year that helped us to feel connected with each other.

As for the Business part of the meeting, it was decided that the Presbytery of Northeast New Jersey (PNENJ) (the new name of the combined presbyteries) will meet four times a year - dates to be determined. We also elected officers. The Presbytery office will be in Rochelle Park as that office is still under lease and would be costly to not use the space. Draft By-Laws, Standing Rules, Sexual Harassment & Misconduct Policy and Child Protection Policy were distributed for review with comments going to one of the three Stated Clerks. They will be voted on at an upcoming meeting.

There was a presentation from the Finance task force that discussed some of the financial ramifications of this new presbytery. The assets and liabilities of the PNENJ are comprised of 100% of assets and liabilities of the Newark Presbytery, 56% of Elizabeth and 90% of the Palisades. This is based on how the new presbytery was created from the churches in those presbyteries.

We also heard a presentation regarding Mission Funding. Mission work and coordinating that work was one of the primary reasons these new presbyteries have been created in the state - to pool resources and opportunities. There will be grants available for mission work - up to \$5,000 a year to be awarded during two cycles. These grants will be open to churches and to community programs.

Finally, we were advised that it is likely that other areas across the country will use the model created by our group to re-imagine their presbyteries. We have the attention of those at the National level and those involved were praised for their efforts over these past few years.

Agape Local Food Boxes

Health and Social Services Agencies are reporting that, as a result of the pandemic, one in four families does not have enough to eat. In addition, at least one study shows a 170% increase in food insecurity among families with children under the age of twelve. Households that never relied on any assistance before, find themselves jobless or with hours/wages drastically cut resulting in an inability to obtain life's basic necessities.

For the last eight months, PCW has been working to provide healthy, fresh food and some essential household supplies to 107 of our neighbors in need. Each week, a list of specific requests is created and circulated in our

email blasts and on our website. Church members and Friends of PCW choose the items they wish to donate, and bring them to the church. Some donors have opted to send monetary contributions which are used to supplement the food bags with protein sources and additional fresh fruit and vegetables. On Fridays, Agape Local volunteers assemble the bags and distribute them to the families.

These psalms were sung by Hebrew worshipers on their way up to Jerusalem, which is situated on a high hill, to attend one of the three main annual Jewish festivals. According to some traditions, the Jewish priests also sang some of these "Songs of Ascent" as they walked up the steps to the temple in Jerusalem. Jesus and his disciples would have sung these psalms on their way to Jerusalem to celebrate Passover.

The 15 psalms will be divided between the sermons and the Adult Bible studies. The Bible study classes will be on Sundays at 11:00 am and Tuesdays at 4:00 pm.
