

A Message from Our Pastor

The leaders of The Presbyterian Church in Westfield have some exciting news about plans to help our members stay connected through this health crisis – indoor worship is returning to our congregation. Now, before we get to thinking that we are getting back to normal, please read on to see (1) how we got here; and (2) what it means for us to do indoor worship, and the restrictions we may face:

How we got here

As you may know we have already maintained some of our small groups, children's ministry, and worship by moving the core of our activities online, and our Senior Network has been tremendous in helping keep our senior members connected through this ordeal. In addition, during the summer our Session moved to allow outdoor, in-person worship, which has now been going on since the beginning of August, and several of our ministries began holding outdoor gatherings on our lawn to take advantage of the opportunity.

At this time, our church leaders recognize that the seasonal weather shift will make it much more difficult to maintain any sort of outdoor activity, and have been seeking to balance both the very real physical health risks with the very real mental and spiritual health needs of our members and

guests. The Session has identified a few ways that we may be able to safely hold indoor gatherings. One important way we are doing this is through worship. While we will continue to have significant restrictions on in-person worship through the duration of the health crisis, we have been meeting in-person weekly since the summer and have learned a great deal of how to limit our risk exposure.

What we are doing

Kicking things off we will bring our Wednesday 7pm worship experience indoors for three weeks in November (the 4th, 11th, and 18th), and starting on November 29th, the first Sunday in Advent, we will have a Sunday service at <u>noon</u> to supplement our online worship. "Why noon?" you may ask. Noon allows for people interested in both worship experiences to participate, and it helps us remember that we are not worshipping in the way we are used to – this is a measure we are taking to celebrate life together when significant restrictions exist, even those that may require suspending this service. It will also make for a much sweeter return when we really do "return."

In both instances, masks are required, we will social distance, and ask everyone to register ahead of time. We will also limit the way we enter and depart, take temperatures and make it possible to conduct contact tracing. Further, if our local health conditions deteriorate we will suspend indoor gathering of any sort until it is safe.

In the coming days similar information will be on our website, distributed through emails and our social media platforms, and shared in our online worship experience. Updates will continue to come to help clarify what we are doing and how.

Mission Commission - AGAPE Local

In February, we were all going about our lives with little thought that everything would be upended by March. The past eight months have been unlike anything that we have experienced in our lives. We have paused our in-person Sunday services. We have discontinued social gatherings. We are maintaining social distance. We are wearing our masks. We are doing all of these things because we value our neighbors and want to do anything that the medical/scientific professionals tell us to do to help mitigate the effects of the coronavirus.

Did you know that in this pandemic, one in four families do not have enough food to feed their families each day? At least one study shows a 170% increase in food insecure families with children under the age of twelve. Families who have never relied on any assistance now find themselves jobless or with hours/wages drastically cut, and are unable to obtain the basic necessities on their own.



Since May, we have been providing food and other necessary household supplies to local families in need. Each week we create a donation list of specific items. Some congregants choose the items they would like to donate and drop them off at the church Monday through Thursday. Many congregants have opted to send in cash donations; those funds are used to supplement the food bags with chicken, beef and additional fresh fruit and vegetables. Unlike many other food pantries, we are supplying healthy, fresh items to the families. On Fridays, Agape Local volunteers put the bags together and distribute them to the families.

The United Nations World Food Programme (WFP) was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize this year for its efforts in combating hunger around the world. The WFP states that there are 690 million people suffering hunger globally, with a projected increase within the year of 250 million additional people starving due to COVID-19. The numbers are difficult to comprehend, especially when you realize that the majority are children.

We here at PCW are not in a position to assist all of the hungry people around the world; we can, however, give of ourselves right here, right now, by helping 97 people in our community who need us. From Our Music Director

Hello Everyone,

Here we are, mid-Autumn. I would ordinarily greet you with words such as "I hope you are well and enjoying beautiful Autumn in NJ". I do hope that, but in these times, that doesn't seem enough. My prayer is that you are healthy, that your loved ones are healthy, that, whatever your living situation, you see or "see" other people enough that you are maintaining connection to people you love in whatever communities you inhabit. If you are reading this, you share with me, and anyone else who reads this, connection (perhaps very important in your life) to the Presbyterian Church in Westfield.

Worship is central to our life together, one of the primary ways in which we experience communion with each other and PCW. So naturally, at each new stage of the Covid-19 pandemic, we wonder: what about worship? Since March, we've experienced online worship in video and written form, as well as outdoor worship, recently including the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. In current events, the Covid-19 pandemic continues in force. According to yesterday's New York Times "the nation...is on pace to record the most new daily cases of the entire pandemic in the coming days." In Westfield, colder weather approaches, outdoor gathering is always possible, but becomes less attractive as the temperature drops and daylight hours decrease. So now, again, we wonder: what about worship?

At the time of this writing, I don't know what exactly the next stage will look like, but here are some of the many thoughts and considerations that inform our conversations about pandemic worship at PCW. In our thinking and planning...

- We endeavor that what is spoken, prayed and sung in worship speaks to the felt need of those who might
 worship with us -- right now, our worship sermon series is "Unhinged", about keeping faith, and how our
 faith continues to speak to us, to lift us, even in uncertain times.
- We consider the ordering of worship itself -- gathering around, listening to, and responding to the word. While online worship isn't the same experience as in-person worship, we are still gathered, we still listen and respond. We hope that, even in its different-ness, our online worship still nourishes and builds community. As worship leaders, we practice, learn and hopefully continue to elevate the online worship experience that we offer. I hope, as you continue to worship online (also practicing, in a sense) your experience of worship includes a sense of gathering, listening and response.
- We consider worship in the context of the past and present "life of the congregation", as well as a variety of futures: immediate (this week, next week), soon (Advent), kind-of soon (winter), the near future (spring) and The Future (later). We are mindful of the affinities that people hold to the different Sunday worship experiences that we've offered through recent years. We plan while at the same time watching as the pandemic and reactive societal choices re-shape our culture. We make educated guesses about what "things" will look like on the other side, but we understand the limits in our ability to predict the future. We also bring forward from pre-pandemic times much thought and planning for worship in the next seasons and years worship that evolves as our congregation evolves, living on our street corner always as the church we are called to be, here and now.
- Above all, I believe we consider the physical and spiritual / emotional health of all in our community. For some, a less physically gathered world (and church) is neutral, tolerable, sometimes even enjoyable. Others profoundly miss gathered community not only at church but in many walks of life. Concurrent to respect for one's spiritual / emotional health is the necessity of caring for each other's and one's own physical well-being. We each respond differently to risk. An unscientific way of looking at personal risk might be that there are four places on a spectrum of interacting with risk -- accepting, reducing, minimizing and eliminating. I probably live most often in the "minimizing" space, sometimes adventuring up to reduction, sometimes retreating toward eliminating. When planning for the possibility of gathered-in-person worship, we understand that "adults make adult decisions" about their own risk. At the same time, in non-pandemic times, we hope that people prioritize "showing up" for church. If we decide to meet for in-person worship during the pandemic, do we set up a situation where people are truly free to "make adult decisions" about risk, or is there extra implied obligation and weight given to "showing up for church."?

You may have heard me speak of one way that I understand the Kingdom of Heaven: a place where everybody matters and where there is always enough to share. Consideration of our worship life for me is on the "everybody matters" side of that duality. As a welcoming and nurturing community, in this time and place, how may we best and most fully walk with each other, walking with God? How do we reconcile the meaning of physical presence in our lives with the inherent risk (in the foreseeable future) in gathering in groups beyond our individual household?

Later this month we will celebrate Thanksgiving, possibly (probably) with intentionally smaller groups of friends and family than in past years. I am grateful for the community of faith we share at PCW, and for my role in the life of our church. I'm thankful for all of our opportunities to worship together, in all times, places and spaces.
